Wheezing Funny feeling in the chest Child's first sign:	 Call your doctor or nurse if: You are not back in the Green Zone after one hour. Inhaler is needed more than every four hours. You are in the Yellow Zone more than 24 hours. More than puffs of steroid/formoterol inhaler are needed in 24 hours, including Green Zone doses. If under 12 years old, no more than eight puffs in 24 hours. If 12 years or older, no more than 12 puffs in 24 hours. If steroid/formoterol inhaler is not available, two to four puffs of albuterol OR one nebulizer up to three times in the first hour, then every four hours as needed. Keep taking Green Zone medicines.
